# St. Paul's Weekly Update - February 13, 2025

#### Minister's Message, Sunday, February 16, 2025

People talk about using their faith as a way to help them make decisions. The classic, or overused, phrase, "what would Jesus do?" comes to mind. This is a kind of appeal to authority. The one in control is Jesus, so just do what he said. However, there are often disagreements about what he said, or what he meant. So how do we know what is true? Who do we listen to? As you can see, this way of making decisions can be misleading. At the least, it is not a very systematic way to make decisions. What Would Jesus  $Do^{TM}$ ? is often a way to justify what you are doing, or a way to judge what others are doing. It is fast and easy and can lead you astray.

So rather than rely on one point of data (or perceived point of data), I offer another way. For hundreds of years in theology people have been using some version of, the "Wesleyan Quadrilateral." It is a 4-pronged way of making a decision described by John Wesley. The basic idea is that any question should be examined using **FOUR** things, scripture, tradition, experience, and reason. Scripture, means the bible. It includes Jesus, because the bible is how we know about Jesus' life and wisdom. Tradition refers to the knowledge passed down: practices, extra stories, and teachings. Experience is our own lives, our particular context, and our unique understanding of the world. Reason is logic, deduction, and problem solving.

Thus we have a more balanced approach to making decisions. We are more likely to see or think about things that we haven't known before. This also is a longer way of making decisions. And sometimes slowing down can help us. When you are lost in the woods, the first thing you want to do is STOP (an acronym that means Sit down, Think, Observe, and Plan). If you are having a panic attack, first breathe. Slowing down gives us more reaction time when driving. We live in a culture that demands speed. But important decisions need time, deliberation, and more information.

Questions to take home...

How do you make major decisions? Minor decisions? What role does your faith play in how you live your life? Is there something in your life that needs a little renewal?

Prayer... (from our worship on Sunday)

Dear God, we pray for strength in our tough times, and for hope when we need it.

In our high-pressure world, it gets hard to follow your path.

#### **This Week's Minute for Mission**

In the Rift Valley of Kenya, over 200,000 people are HIV positive, and many will not survive. Grandmothers whose children have died of AIDS are often left alone to care for their grandchildren, and to add insult to injury, their church community condemns them, leaving them without support as they raise their grandchildren.

Some pastors in the Rift Valley, as in many other places, believe and teach that faithful Christians cannot contract the disease and that it is a judgment from God—a disease for sexual sinners. "The pastors had little information about HIV and AIDS; to them, and others in the community, it was a strange disease.... [They believed] HIV was a result of sexual sin and was a judgement from God for the sexually immoral," writes Esther Mombo of the World Council of Churches.

In partnership with the United Church of Canada, Mombo and Pauline Wanjuru of St. Paul's University in Limuru, Kenya, led a series of workshops in one Rift Valley community that has been hit especially hard by HIV/AIDS. They invited grandmothers and pastors to connect and learn from each other. One grandmother who attended the workshops was 70 years old. She was raising three grandchildren on her own after losing both her daughter and her son. Instead of stepping up to help, her neighbours refused to visit her because they said her daughter and son had been sexually immoral. Her pastor wouldn't even attend her children's funerals because he didn't want to be seen associating with her family. When she went to church, the pastor preached about the punishment for sexual immorality.

At the workshops, this woman bravely told her story to the pastors who attended. She also shared with them how it felt to be shamed for loving her children and caring for her grandchildren. Another grandmother explained that her grandchildren were born with the virus and couldn't have been involved in any sexual immorality. Yet another spoke of God's love for everyone. Pastors listened and learned and moved forward by making a commitment to extend compassion and offer pastoral care to the grandmothers.

All of us know from our own life experience that when we know better, we do better. Your <u>Mission</u> and <u>Service</u> gifts gave these grandmothers the opportunity to help their pastors learn to do better by connecting their love for their grandchildren to God's love for all. Thank you.
